Emergency Braking

I recently moved to a new neighborhood and some of my neighbors are buying scooters to sport around with during the summer. They know that I ride and one day I was approached with the question ... What is the most important thing about riding? I immediately responded: to know your bike's capabilities and know how to properly brake. They looked at me like I had two heads and I heard the comment, "It's simple, you just squeeze the brakes and you'll stop."



So I turned it around and asked, "How would you do an evasive emergency stop?" The silence was deafening. I then said, "It's a snap ... practice emergency, maximum braking. But, first there are a couple of things you need to know." Number 1: The front brake is 70% of your braking force. Due to that fact, you must put more pressure on the front brake than the rear brake. If you happen to lock the front tire, you must release it immediately then reapply it. Squeeze the front brake and apply increasing pressure, don't grab it. If you lock the rear tire, don't release it. If you do, there's a good chance you will high side and be thrown off the motorcycle. With a motorcycle, you can still steer when the rear tire is locked and skidding. If you should lock up the rear tire, remember to keep it locked and steer accordingly until you've stopped. You must also remember that the motorcycle must be straight up when performing maximum braking. This is not to say that you can't brake with the bike leaned over in a turn. You can lightly brake with both brakes in that situation, but maximum braking must be done with the bike straight up. Guess what, I got their attention after explaining the issues of braking.

The points made were that you must learn to modulate your brakes to keep from locking them and the only way to do that is to practice, practice, practice, practice. Keep repeating to yourself to use that front brake with controlled, increasing pressure ... and don't grab it! That will assist you in putting more pressure on the front brake than the rear brake.

Bike vertical, stabilized at speed, 2nd gear or higher Head and eyes up Squeeze clutch, roll off throttle Both brakes together Progressively harder on front, ease up on rear on rear Come to complete stop, right foot on rear brake, left foot to ground

You should practice maximum braking from whatever speed you normally ride. If you practice, then in an emergency situation, you will revert to your training to maximize your chances of a successful hard stop. Another alternative is to buy a bike with anti-lock brakes, just remember, even with anti-lock brakes, the bike still has to be straight up to perform maximum braking.





The History of the Motorcycle

Last month, we took you from the middle of the 19th Century to the early 1900's.

Now at the turn of the century, 1901, the English bicycle maker Royal Enfield introduced its first motorcycle, a 239 cc engine mounted in the front and driving a rear wheel through a belt. The very next year, Triumph threw its hat into the ring and, by 1902, the company had produced its first motorcycle ... again a bicycle fitted with a Belgian-built engine. Within only 2 years, sales of Triumph motorcycles hit an all-time high of 500. That was the year, 1903, Harley-Davidson started to produce their motorcycles. The next company to come to market was the "Diamond Framed" Indian Single, produced in one color, "Deep Blue," ... the brain storm of 2 bicycle racers. One year later, production rose to 500. Eleven years go by and production rises to 32,000. Not bad, but were they all in blue?

Two young entrepreneurs, William S. Harley and Arthur Davidson partner in 1901 and opened a factory. In 1903, the first production Harley-Davidson motorcycle was introduced to the public. The bike was built to be a racing motorcycle. The factory was the famous 10 X 15 wooden shed that was located in the Davidson's family backyard in Milwau-

kee, Wisconsin and still exists with the words "Harley-Davidson Motor Company" etched into the side. Only three motorcycles were built that year. Henry Meyer of Milwaukee, a grade school friend of William Harley and Arthur Davidson, buys the first 1903 model direct from the factory. That sale was enough to boost their confidence and send them on their way to form the Harley-Davidson Motor Company. The Journey Begins!

Well it didn't take long to sell a franchise. In 1904, the first Harley-Davidson Dealer, C.H. Lang, opens its doors in Chicago and sells one of the 3 original bikes Two years later in 1906, a new factory is built measuring 28 X 80 feet and the very next year, on September 17th, 1907, the company was incorporated.



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
The Harley-Davidson Company, now on a roll, sends Walter Davidson, Arthur's brother, to race at the Federation of American Motorcyclists Endurance and Reliability Contest. Walter sets the FAM economy record at 188.23 miles per gallon.

During the period from 1900 to 1910, a proliferation of many European and American motorcycle companies came about. Experimentation and innovation were driven by the new sport of motorcycle racing with the added incentive to build tough, fast reliable motorcycles. The public became the beneficiaries of these enhancements.

Harley-Davidson's early entry onto the battlefield came during the early 1900's in border skirmishes between the United States and Mexico with Pancho Villa. So successful were the motorcycles during that time that they would soon find their way supporting the infantry in World War I, but that's a story for another day.

So what's in store for the motorcycle in the next decade and how it makes its entry into World War I will be the focus of next month's article.


