





Crossing Intersections

On Sunday, Sept 29th, I opened the morning paper and saw something that made my heart sink with sadness. A biker, after riding a military escort to LI MacArthur Airport, was hit by a van broadside on Rt. 454 that passed a red light. The biker was 44 years old with three children and, as the story was written, he was doing something he loved ... riding and helping others. The story made me rethink of the #1 cause of injuries and death we all face when riding ... crossing in-



tersections. Based on this man's tragedy, I am reiterating an article I wrote about six months ago. It's that important!!



Whenever crossing an intersection, you MUST anticipate that someone will do something that will create a major problem for you. Some examples: Stopping midway into a turn or intersection, oncoming left turns and people ignoring stop signs and red lights. It's been determined that the best ways to avoid an accident in these situations are: First, look at least 12 seconds ahead of your motorcycle. Your eyes should be scanning from left to right and up and down ... especially at intersections. The sooner you see the potential hazard, the more time you'll have to react instinctively and plan your approach. Second, since most accidents happen at intersections, slow down when approaching one. Check to see if anyone is about to pass that red light or stop sign. Cover both your front and rear brakes as you get closer to the intersection. Position

your bike to the left side of your lane. If you're going to have to swerve around the left turning vehicle, your swerve will usually be to the left around the back of the vehicle and then quickly back to the right. However, most of the time in that situation, your only course of action will be to stop quickly using both your front and rear brakes. That's why it is so important to take a safety course where they drill you through emergency stops and to practice emergency braking using both brakes. The average rider never practices emergency braking. Consequently, in the situation I described, the average rider slams on the rear brake, locks the tire and skids right into the vehicle. Even if he misses the vehicle, he still slides onto the ground which can cause serious injury. This could have been an avoidable accident using awareness of an approaching hazard and instinctively preparing for a possible evasive maneuver. The bottom line is to <u>always</u> anticipate and be prepared for others who, unintentionally or due to their intoxication, cause us to react to an imminent danger.

Don't be a statistic. Remember, when approaching intersections assume that someone will do something to cause you grief and be prepared to react in time to avoid it.

Ride safe, ride often and have a blast!




