

Riding the Rockies by Steve Ficalora

As some of you may have seen from My Personal FB posts, I flew out to Colorado to ride with three very close friends and wound up visiting a fourth while I was there. While We've ridden in Colorado previously, this was our "Plan B" as or original trip planned for July was to fly out to Seattle and ride into Banff national Park was cancelled due to the Canadian border being closed and the unsafe conditions in the Northwest.

We were able to get non-stop flights to Denver out of LaGuardia, which is always a plus. If you've never done a "Fly and Rent" trip, there are certain additional logistics that need to be addressed. Besides the route planning, hotel bookings and bike rentals, you need to make sure you bring all of those items that are normally on your bike at home: water bottle, rain gear, GPS routes, maps, and tools, unless of course you want your trip to be cut short waiting for roadside assistance. I also have a set of cheap portable highway pegs to make the rental a little more comfortable. The other challenge is space: You can only bring what will fit on the rental if you plan to travel to different towns. You'll also need to find somewhere to store that suitcase you brought on the plane. Normally we stay at the same hotel at the start and end of a trip such as this and just leave them there, but this time we needed to ask Eagle Riders to hold onto our bags, which they did for us without an issue.

I cannot say enough about Colorado and the amazing places we rode and saw during this 1,800 mile journey. Starting out from Denver we rode through Rocky Mountain National Park, which was breathtaking. Getting there was also half the fun as we avoided highway's as much as possible. We stopped in Leadville and stayed at the historic Delaware Hotel.

The next day we spent most of the day on the Top of the Rockies Scenic Byway, stopping in Aspen for coffee, and ending the day in Montrose. On day three we rode from Montrose to Durango along the Gunnison river, passing by the Blue Mesa Dam and reservoir. Durango is a very cool town and as we had been here previously, we planned to stay 2 nights. The next day was a planned day ride of the Million Dollar Highway (AKA San Juan Skyway & US 550) with a stop in Telluride for lunch and a different scenic ride back to the hotel. Telluride was a lot of fun and I enjoyed parking the bike and taking the free sky tram into town, which also avoided any potential parking issues. I will definitely go back to Durango again one day as there's a scenic railway tour I'd like to go on!

Leaving Durango bound for Trinidad on Day 5, the highlight of this day's riding was the San Isabel National forest which had some of the bluest lakes I've ever seen. On this day we rode through Colorado and into New Mexico arriving back in Colorado. I can tell you that Colorado maintains its roads and New Mexico does not! The following day we spent some additional riding time in San Isabel National forest on our way to Manitou Springs, stopping in Florence at the Pour House, one of the best coffee houses I've been to! After getting recharged, we then proceeded on our own charge up Pikes Peak. What an amazing experience. This is definitely the most challenging road I've ever ridden on two wheels.

On the last riding day, we rode through Pike national forest on our way back to Denver. I split off about half-way to go visit a childhood friend and next-door neighbor I had not seen in years (ok, decades?). Catching up for 3 hours still wasn't enough, but as the skies began to darken I knew it was high time to "get out of Dodge", so to speak, or risk getting wet (which I did, but didn't care). After returning the bike I caught up with the rest of the group and we enjoyed the Denver area that night and the following day, opting to have a rest day before flying home.

SEPTEMBER SAFETY ARTICLE BY DOM MOZZONE SAFE INTERSECTIONS

Crossing Intersections:



Earlier this week I got a new notice on my phone that a motorcyclist was seriously injured on Middle Country Road when a car facing westbound was making a left turn at 5:50 PM in front of the oncoming bike and struck it sending the rider into the air. He survived this crash but is in critical condition. Keep in mind the sun sets in the west and this car was facing west into a setting sun. With vision possibly obstructed a bit the on-coming bike has a small visual signature and broadsided the car when the left turn was executed. Always be aware of your environment, including time of day, direction and anticipate blind spots etc. The story made me rethink of the #1 cause of injuries and death we all face when riding, crossing intersections. Bases on this man's tragedy I am reiterating an article I wrote last year. It's that important!!

Whenever crossing an intersection you MUST anticipate that someone will do something that will create a major problem for you. Some examples: Stopping mid way into a turn or intersection, on coming left turns and people ignoring stop signs and red lights. Its been determined that the best ways to avoid an accident in these situations is: First, look at least 12 seconds ahead of your motorcycle. Your eyes should be scanning from left to right and up and down especially at intersections. The sooner you see the potential hazard, the more time you'll have to react instinctively and plan your approach. Second, since most accidents happen at intersections, slow down when approaching one, check to see if anyone is about to pass that red light or stop sign. Cover both your front and rear brakes as you get closer to the intersection. Position your bike to the left side of your lane. If you're going to have to swerve around the left turning vehicle, your swerve will usually be to the left around the back of the vehicle and then quickly back to the right. However, most of the time in that situation, your only course of action will be to stop quickly using both your front and rear brakes. That's why it is so important to take a safety course where they drill you through emergency stops and to practice emergency braking using both brakes. The average rider never practices emergency braking, consequently, in the situation I described, the average rider slams on the rear brake, locks the tire and skids right into the vehicle. Even if he misses the vehicle, he still slides onto the ground which can cause serious injury. This could have been an avoidable accident using awareness of an approaching hazard and instinctively preparing for a possible evasive maneuver. The bottom line is to always anticipate and be prepared for others who unintentionally; or, due to their intoxication, cause us grief.

Don't be a statistic. Remember, when approaching intersections assume that someone will do something to cause you grief and be prepared to react in time to avoid it. Ride safe, ride often and have a blast!
